

Review of: "Possibilism in Technology: A Spanish-Speaking Response to Technological Determinism"

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Following the approach of my colleagues in open peer review, it is true that the paper has a somewhat narrow focus on Broncano's work. However, I believe that this specific focus is precisely what makes it valuable as a popular science article and useful for enriching general knowledge about this branch of the philosophy of technology. Philosophical thought can be illuminated from a purely abstract viewpoint or made concrete in its practical application to the understanding of social changes, and in this case, it provides a good application to the interpretation of socio-technological changes.

Although I do miss some concrete argumentative developments regarding more critical views of technological possibilism, especially in the final part, I appreciate that this is a paper that emphasizes an optimistic and dialectical approach to the relationship between technology and society.

What I would highlight the most as a possible avenue for improvement or as a future line of research is the specific grounding of this school of thought in the Spanish-speaking world, of course, rooted in Ortega y Gasset, but also with contemporary authors who continue to broaden the perspective, even from other fields within the humanities and social sciences.
