

# Review of: "A Villain in Disguise in the Management of Painful Peripheral Neuropathy: A Case Report"

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The article discusses the clinically significant problem of neuropathy after pharmacological treatment of tuberculosis. This is important because the treatment of tuberculosis is extremely important and cannot be interrupted. An interesting observation is the description of a case of limb neuropathy in a 17-year-old person. And interestingly, the pain subsides after changing the treatment regimen.

My comments relate to the weakness of pain assessment and the use of a visual-analog scale only. There are no behavioral scales of pain assessment or other comparative scales used, therefore the result of pain treatment, although positive, may be perceived as a subjective feeling of the patient and the treating team.

I would suggest adding the results from the concurrent pain assessment and I would present a broader context of changes in the limbs accompanying the pain. it would be good to show an MRI or x-ray or even a picture of the limbs nevertheless, the article as a short report with minor changes is acceptable.
