This article presents an interesting account of participatory budgeting on environmental sustainability projects at a Thai University by providing a succinct exposition of the research context and case study. This study is relevant to the domains pertaining to higher education and sustainability.

This research has potential and could be further enhanced if the following recommendations are considered:

- Reference to other similar studies is imperative, to highlight any comparisons or differences with the findings obtained.
- A separate methodology section needs to be incorporated, clearly explaining the data collection process. Further detail
 about the questionnaire's relevance and method of dissemination needs to be discussed.
- The methodology section needs to make reference to content and thematic analysis, as discussed in the 'Data
 Analysis' section. The author needs to clearly delineate why was this method used, how it was carried out, and its
 relevance for this research.
- In the data analysis, the author could also consider differentiating the views of students, academic staff and support staff (while still respecting anonymity). It would be interesting to see whether similar views were expressed by the aforementioned.
- A final section entitled 'Conclusion' needs to be inserted, providing some concrete recommendations derived from the
 results.
