- 4- In the Discussion, pay attention to the second paragraph: "Our study also discovers that..."; remember, the goal of this study is not to "discover," but to "report facts."
- 5- As we know, in Africa, after independence, the majority of the countries provide free health care. It sounds good to compare medical corruption among countries with "free health care" and "not free health care."
- 6- In the majority of the countries in Africa, the health sector has the "public system," "private system," and "mixed system." It sounds good to compare medical corruption among those systems.
- 7- In conclusion, some words about "medical corruption." I understand your facts when your "literature review" talks about this in "developed/rich countries." It is a real fact; we cannot hide that. On one hand, it works well, but on another hand, it works as an incentive to be corrupt, once it also exists in the USA/Europe. The African younger generation can become corrupt. The explanation will be that "corruption also exists in rich countries."

I do not have a suggestion for how to work the literature about "medical corruption" in the developed countries, but I suggest touching on that as a manner not to incentivize corruption in our country.
