Review of: "Tomorrow's Buildings: What Are the Occupational Health and Safety Issues?"

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Thank you for submitting this manuscript, which I think is globally interesting and pertinent at the current time. Despite this, I have a few broad questions:

- The approach followed in the article is very macroscopic, and the scenarios presented, despite being based on current problems (e.g., accidents at work; subcontracting), seem a bit abstract. Some concrete examples could enrich the text (e.g., "(...) it is necessary to avoid fragmented and uncoordinated interventions which can increase the number of accidents, in particular, falls on renovation" – what kind of interventions specifically, knowing that accidents at work are multi-causal in nature?).
- Point 3.2.2: It's not clear when you say "(...) we know that it is through training that positive attitudes to occupational risk prevention can be acquired". It depends on the way training is conceived and organised, and whether it is anchored in real work activity. The authors can explore this further in the article.
- Minor comment: The legend in figure 1 should appear immediately after the table.
