Review of: "A Review of Transformation and Digital Literacy for the Sustainable Development in the Greater Mekong Subregion – Working Paper"

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This working paper sets out to present a comprehensive review of the interplay between transformation and digital literacy as key drivers of sustainable development in the Greater Mekong Subregion (GMS). It highlights the region's pressing challenges—economic, environmental, and social—and emphasizes the need to understand both sustainable transformation and digital literacy in fostering inclusive growth. The paper aspires to provide strategic insights to guide policymakers and stakeholders.

However, as a first draft, it falls short of the comprehensive analysis it promises. While the conceptual framing is well-intentioned, the paper lacks empirical data and concrete evidence to substantiate its claims. The absence of in-depth analysis and data-driven discussion weakens its ability to offer actionable recommendations or meet the broader objectives outlined in the abstract. Substantial revisions, including empirical support and clearer integration of sustainability themes, are necessary to strengthen the paper's impact.
