A significant strength of the manuscript lies in its detailed examination of attention's role in cognitive processes, particularly in how attention influences neural signals in different pathways. The author's emphasis on neurotransmitters like dopamine and glutamate and their involvement in attention deficits in schizophrenia is supported by existing literature. This neurochemical perspective enhances the discussion on how attention disruptions manifest in schizophrenic patients and their wider impact on cognitive abilities. Furthermore, the proposed experimental design, which assesses patients' ability to switch attention between visual stimuli, is a valuable contribution that may lead to future research.

Nevertheless, despite the manuscript's solid theoretical groundwork, the hypotheses and experimental design require empirical validation. Consequently, the study remains in a conceptual phase, necessitating further experimental work to support the claims. Moreover, while the manuscript explores the theoretical foundations of attention deficits, there is limited discussion on translating these findings into clinical applications. Enhancing the manuscript with more clarity on potential therapeutic interventions based on the research findings would significantly improve its clinical relevance.

In conclusion, the manuscript provides valuable insights into the interplay between attention and schizophrenia, contributing meaningfully to the field. However, additional empirical testing and a clearer articulation of the clinical implications can strengthen the manuscript's overall impact.
