The manuscript addresses an interesting domain of digital identity for researchers and the online platforms' role in enhancing their research outputs, especially the digital identity of social science researchers at Taiwanese universities.

There are some suggestions proposed below to improve the manuscript.

Overall, this manuscript is written well, with some typo errors to be corrected.

The authors provide a good overview of digital identity debates. The authors may decide to conduct a more in-depth investigation of the problems to make this a reality for researchers in the digital sphere. Further study could describe how these problems are addressed or mitigated by the research platforms considered.

Cited references in a research paper play a central role in demonstrating the necessity of the research and establishing the validity and significance of the research results. Therefore, good referencing practices increase the research paper's quality and facilitate its peer review and availability to the right audience.

A good rule of thumb is to use sources published in the past five years.

Although this research targeted social science researchers at Taiwanese universities, the findings may apply to other countries with some contextual modification or catalyze similar research.
