Please consider that abbreviations are not usually used in the title. EFL. Could be "English as a Foreign Language"? This should be explained at least once and not used as it is in the body title.

In abstracts, we do not use scientific references.

As a general overview, the present paper addresses the topic of coping of the staff who activate to support patients affected by COVID in a rather too personal point of vue, not very well-processed manner, and with an often outdated bibliography.

The canons of the scientific article require the completion of some necessary steps to present personal opinions or working hypotheses in a clear, concise, organized way that arouses interest but at the same time clarifies.

I think that the article would benefit from the structuring of the material, from a more careful writing, from the explanation of the motivation of the work, the working hypotheses, the way in which it was conceived, results, discussions, limitations of the study carried out, and, last but not least, conclusions.

The bibliography used must definitely be updated and inserted correctly and revealingly in the text.
