Then it should describe each answer and summarize them in a discussion.

Regarding the interpretation of rural communities in Igbo regarding language and coronaviruses, the number of people who can correctly explain the language of rural communities in Igbo and its interpretation regarding coronaviruses is limited. But this is an important point, and one of the critical points of the research methodology is how to secure these people and interview them.
