

Review of: "Could governmental interventions improve subjective well-being during the COVID-19 pandemic? Findings from 750 street vendors in Cali, Colombia"

This is an interesting study that specifically examines the situation of street vendors in Cali, Colombia. Despite prior abundant studies focuses on the COVID-19 pandemic, this study stands out by offering unique insights into the effects of the pandemic and governmental responses on underserved and vulnerable population in a country with civil conflict. This study reflects a comprehensive work, deserving a recognition. Here my suggestions to improve the quality and clarity of the manuscript:

- 1. METHOD: Please describe the roles of the variables within the study, identifying which serve as predictors, confounders, and moderators
- 2. METHOD: Could you specify the stepwise strategy employed in the analysis? Forward or backward selection?
- 3. METHOD: A more detailed description of the data analysis is required, particularly regarding the use of hierarchical regression to evaluate the moderator effect. This aspect seems to have been omitted.
- 4. RESULTS: How to build models 1-4 requires further description, as tracing the process from supplemental table 8 is challenging.
- 5. RESULTS: Presenting the descriptive characteristics of the sample as a table may enhance readability
- 6. RESULTS: I wonder what is the purpose of "Relationship between time use and business performance" as it was not explicitly stated as a specific goal of the study.
- 7. RESULTS: While Figures 1-6 lack a Y-axis, I suggest that the information from these figures could be more succinctly presented in the text. Visualizing each relationship with individual figures may be somewhat redundant.
- 8. DISCUSSION: This section could also benefit from a more focused examination of the significant predictors and moderators for all dimensions of subjective well-being.
