- Ensure consistency in terminology (e.g., "sample size from each sector" vs. "sample size from each stratum").
- When using formulas like the sample size calculation, it's good practice to provide a reference for the formula (e.g., Yamane, 2017).

Results and Discussion

- Expand the discussion by exploring potential reasons behind the observed relationships and the implications of these findings for policy or practice.
- Ensure consistent use of symbols across the section (e.g., Lack of Training (LTR) vs. LTT in earlier sections).
