This paper discusses the policies on the control of COVID-19 in Greece, particularly related to the implementation of mandatory COVID-19 vaccinations of health care workers.

The topic is very interesting and relevant to the issues currently being discussed on COVID-19 policies and vaccination mandates.

However, the article would benefit from major revision. The paper needed editing and proofreading to allow readers to more clearly and concisely understand what the author is trying to convey. Some important references are missing; it would also be helpful to add in all the citations, particularly references to the policies and impact of the policies discussed in the introduction. It is not clear what the main objectives of the paper is and how the authors aimed address the aims. For example, how do the authors plan to “demonstrate that vaccine mandates in HCWs could harm healthcare from a holistic point of view”? Additional information is needed on the method the authors took to answering the aim (literature review?). Sub-headings within the discussion section on the key topic areas being explored and describing these areas in the introduction, would be helpful to guide readers in better understanding this article. Additionally, the title may need to be edited to better reflect the content of the paper.
