

Review of: "Reassessing Cervical Cancer Prevention: Evaluating the NHS Cervical Cancer Screening Programme Through the Health Belief Model and Global Health Promotion Strategies"

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It is interesting that many countries are not doing enough to ensure HPV vaccination and cervical cancer screening, despite the World Health Organization's (WHO) ambitious goal to eliminate cervical cancer by 2030.

The article presents the author's viewpoint based on the analysis of various papers and data. It focuses on increasing cervical cancer screening and highlights some of the merits and limitations of the Health Belief Model and the Ottawa Charter in improving this process.
