The paper is clearly written and provides useful references on an important topic. My reservation is that the paper does not seem to break new ground, and its recommendations are unspecific. Urging companies to pay attention to the possibility of AI bias in hiring is sort of nebulous. Saying that we need to figure out liability when an autonomous vehicle kills a pedestrian is true, but it doesn't propose a legal theory. For example, it may be that AVs can become so much safer than humans that, like vaccine adverse reactions, it is in the public interest to require everyone to use an AV and have the government pay directly when there is an extremely rare fatality (this is all just speculation, of course---I am no expert).
