- The conceptual framework is deemed lacking in visual representation, and recommendations arising from the research are considered underdeveloped. A visual representation of the framework is suggested for clarity.

3. Survey Development and Analysis:

- A request is made for a more detailed explanation of how the survey was developed and how survey items were determined. Clarity in the methodology is essential for a better understanding of the research process.
- The addition of the "importance" variable is seen as complicating the study, leading to confusion about dependent and independent variables.

4. Literature Review and Focus:

- Concerns are raised about the general nature of the literature review. Suggestions include a more focused review, emphasizing relevant works such as those from the African Educational Research Journal and James Oleroch.
- Reviewers recommend a more concentrated research problem definition, concentrating on specific variables like learner satisfaction and academic performance in junior secondary and mathematics.

Conclusion:

The overall sentiment from reviewers is mixed. While the research is applauded for addressing an important topic and indicating areas for school improvement based on learner satisfaction, there are substantial concerns about the methodology, structure, literature review, and focus. The recommendations converge on the necessity for a more refined, focused, and well-structured approach, incorporating visual aids where needed. The study's impact can be enhanced through addressing these critiques, providing a more robust contribution to the understanding of learner satisfaction in secondary school education.
