

# Review of: "Mandatory vaccinations, the segregation of citizens and promotion of inequality in the modern democracy of Greece. Is science allowed to "enforce" or silently back-up such policies?"

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This interesting article summarizes several major studies on the Covid 19 pandemic, while questioning the rationality and justification of the segregation policies of citizens and health personnel in Greece. It shows that vaccine efficacy operates at the individual level but does not create any collective protection against Covid 19. Furthermore, it is shown that vaccinated individuals spread sras cov on a large scale. These facts do not seem to influence the Greek policy of applying a ban to unvaccinated individuals. In addition, the health care system is threatened by the decline in the number of health care workers, resulting in a higher mortality rate in Greece.

The article would benefit from being better linked to the tables and figures presented in the appendix, which are difficult to read and interpret. The question raised in the title "Is science allowed to 'impose' or silently support policies?" cannot be answered because there is no mention of the role of scientists and the division of scientists on the long-term consequences of Covid 19. It would be interesting to analyze how pandemic experts and physicians were or were not integrated into the policies of pandemic restriction in Greece.

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
