As an opinion piece, the article provides a narrative review of the issues. However, outlining a more systematic approach to how literature and data were reviewed could strengthen the article's credibility. The article touches on future directions but could provide a more detailed roadmap for research, policy, and practice changes needed to achieve the decolonization of healthcare. The article would be enriched by including more perspectives from local health care professionals, patients, and policymakers in East Africa to provide a more nuanced view of the impact of decolonization efforts.

It is commendable that the authors recognize the importance of diversity and inclusion in research. However, a discussion on how to effectively implement inclusive research practices would be beneficial.
