

Review of: "The Efficacy of Copper Nanoparticles in Treating Viral Skin Infections: A Systematic Review and Meta-Analysis"

- 1. The objective of a systematic review or meta-analysis is to condescend information on a specific topic and evaluate the quality and methodology used in the research to serve in the decision-making process. This systematic review lacks an analysis of methodologies; therefore, it would not be useful when consulting to make a decision, for example, on the benefit of using Cu-NPs in the treatment of viral skin infections.
- 2. Did the authors use any guidelines to perform a systematic review (for example PRISMA)?
- 3. The authors do not highlight the novelty of this systematic review.
- 4. Why were copper nanoparticles chosen for this systematic review, which are less biocompatible than other nanoparticles with better antiviral properties, such as silver or ZnO?
- 5. Why are figures not included to show the results of the analyzed papers?
- 6. The analysis is very superficial; they do not delve into why Cu-NPs are chosen as an antiviral alternative for skin infections, nor into the antiviral mechanism. They make a brief mention of how they can be applied, but nothing in detail.
- 7. The way the article is structured is more in line with a book chapter than a systematic review article.

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
