This article limits its scope only to the perspective of the lecturers. Although this reflects the sentiment of the lecturers, yet their views are only one aspect of the teaching and learning situation. Effectiveness of any mode of delivery or pedagogy would always need the feedback of the learners because they are at the receiving end of the teaching and learning process. Evaluating a classroom scenario can be more appropriate when both teachers' and learners' perspectives are taken as variables. This study could be a preliminary step towards a more comprehensive investigation into the currrent need to improve quality of teaching and learning from multiple perspectives.

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
