As a sociologist, I would have liked to read more on the impact of the socio-cultural context (British) on the identity change (perhaps transformation?) of the participants, but I can appreciate that this has not been the target of this work. Also, I would be curious to see if and how 'trauma' may have something to add to this discussion, but again, this work had a different focus.
