

## Review of: "Online learning during the COVID-19 pandemic, lessons learned and what's next?"

The article offers awide-ranging consideration of factors impacting the learning during Covid19. Many of these are considered a global basis with a range of examples provided. Unfortunately the broad scope of what the article is trying to address means that it's difficult for the reader to grasp what argument the author is trying to make, it also jumps around considerably and would benefit from both reworking in terms of structure and points addressed. For example, while an interesting detail, it's not entirely clear how teacher vaccination statusis related to online learning. In addition to this it would be helpful if the author could include some relevant weighting of the issues considered. The provided table offers some useful suggestions but is not sufficiently clearly linked to the text and is lacking in alternative text meaning this is not accessible for some readers (Alt text should be provided for all images, tables and figures). Now the pandemic has subsided it would be worthwhile if the conclusions could be refined in terms of the future - e.g. which lessons can we take forward and implement into current teaching practices?
