Overall review comments:

- 1. The paper is well-written and provides a comprehensive overview of the benefits of FWS in rural areas with declining populations. The use of interview data adds depth and personal touch to the analysis.
- 2. Some sections could benefit from further clarification and conciseness.
- 3. Consider adding a conclusion that summarizes the key findings and implications for future research.

Specific comments:

Introduction:

- Consider elaborating more on the specific challenges faced by rural areas with declining populations in the context of Japan.
- 2. Briefly explain the concept of "fieldwork studies" (FWS) and its different types.

Theoretical Background:

- 1. Briefly mention the potential limitations of FWS, such as the issue of power dynamics between students and residents.
- 2. The section on "Rural Development and University in Japan" could be integrated into the previous section for better flow.
- 3. The section on the educational benefits of FWS could be strengthened by providing more specific examples of skills and knowledge gained by students through FWS.
- 4. Consider mentioning potential limitations or challenges of FWS.
 - 1. Provide more details about the interview process, such as the selection criteria for participants and the duration of interviews.

Rural Development and University in Japan:

- 1. The figures could be explained more explicitly in the text to enhance their impact.
- 2. Briefly discuss the reasons for the decline in population in rural Japan and the challenges it presents.

Counterpart Communities:



- 3. This section could be expanded to include more examples of specific FWS projects and collaborations between universities and rural communities.
- 4. Consider discussing the challenges and opportunities faced by both universities and communities in implementing FWS programs.

Methodology:

Specific revisions:

- Page 2: "However, not all regions have universities." This sentence could be rephrased to be more impactful, for
 example: "The lack of universities in many rural areas presents a significant challenge for fostering young talent and
 revitalizing these communities."
- 2. Page 3: Consider adding a brief explanation of the Kansai region and its demographics.
- 3. Page 4: The description of the interview participants could be expanded to include more details about their academic disciplines, motivations for participating in FWS, and career aspirations.
- 4. Page 5-6: The examples of FWS activities could be categorized or grouped based on themes to improve readability.
- Page 7-8: Consider using subheadings to organize the discussion section by theme, such as "Impact on students' personal and professional development," "Impact on rural communities," and "Challenges and future directions."

Results:

- 1. The section on "Graduates" could be reorganized to improve clarity. Consider grouping similar themes together, such as graduates' current work, impact on rural communities, and personal values.
- 2. Some quotes are quite lengthy. Consider shortening them while preserving the key message.

Discussion:

- 1. The comparison with Rubinger's work on private schools in Japan is interesting but could be further developed. Explain how it relates to the current study's findings.
- 2. The final sentence is a bit abrupt. Consider expanding on the idea of "hometowns" and their significance in the context of FWS.

Additional suggestions:

- 1. Consider adding a figure or table to summarize the key findings of the study.
- 2. Consider adding a conclusion section to summarize the main findings and implications of the research.
- 3. Ensure proper citation of all sources throughout the paper.
- 4. Proofread the paper carefully for any typos or grammatical errors.
