The article presented a quite interesting study regarding the perceptions of microaggressions in terms of racial stereotyping and/or discrimination experienced by students from minority backgrounds. While providing a good insight into how previous experiences, either at schools or in neighbourhoods, influence the ways those students perceive microaggression, the article needs some improvement, like the number of N (as mentioned by authors), and also, if possible, to develop and test more advanced theoretical models and use a more rigorous statistical analysis (regression or others). It is better if the authors explore, elaborate on, and test other variables (i.e., socio-demographic backgrounds of students, degrees of sociability, and so forth) which might explain their perception and sensitiveness to microaggressions.
