The author collected samples of exudate gum from the *Acacia pycnantha* plant, obtaining yield results and preliminary insights into its productivity. The topic appears to be relevant, but the study presents several critical issues that need to be addressed:

2. The text does not provide georeferencing information for the samples.
3. The study's methodology is not well-detailed, and it is unclear how the samples were collected, weighed, and processed. At a certain point in the reading, it is understood that the samples were consumed shortly after collection. In this case, how were they weighed? What was the need for calcium carbonate? Were the samples stored?
