- What role should the National Board of Accreditation have? Should all engineering schools, including those in affiliated institutions, be subject to compulsory accreditation? How do we keep the accreditation criteria relevant?
- My son undertook a Sandwich degree at the University of Technology Sydney (UTS). It took 5 or 6 years, and he
 received a BEng degree. Other universities offered a standard engineering degree over four years. UTS realised that
 this system was "unfair" and students were awarded a double bachelor's degree on completion of the five- or six-year
 course.
