There are some significant issues of the paper:

1. Quite a lot of arguments in the paper are incorrect or subjective. For example: this aspect has never been studied before (abstract), English Language is a very important language in the world today and it is equally important in the context of India too (Introduction), English is the only language which is understood at almost all the places, As such communication doesn't have anything to do with any particular language and it is just a means to convey messages. Task Based Language Teaching is currently the most used approach to teaching second or foreign language and perhaps, the most researched field.
2. The language use in this paper is informal: use of contraction, word choices, etc. Therefore, in almost all the professional and business institutions in India English Language communication skills are taught, good understanding of English will give the students access to the huge library all across the world.
3. There are many mistakes in grammatical usage: In India there are more than 30 regional language spoken in different parts, In addition to English being necessary to get jobs, it is also important to even understand the higher education subjects.
4. There is an incorrect use of in-text citation and a lack of updated papers, especially in the Introduction and Literature review
5. The use of questionnaire is not rigorous enough to bring reliable and valid data for this study.
6. No deep analysis of the Paired Sample T-Test Results was provided to shed light on the meaning of such result
7. The discussion section was not provided to bring the significance of the study. In other words, it is still unclear how meaningful the study is and in what way other researchers can benefit from the study.
8. The paper should follow a consistent referencing format (e.g., APA) throughout the paper.
