

Review of: "A Survey Study on Women Entrepreneurship in the BTR Area of Assam"

The research is intriguing as it highlights the challenges faced by women in entrepreneurship, particularly in developing nations. The article tackles a significant subject by concentrating on women's entrepreneurship in a particular area, which may have socio-economic ramifications. It clarifies the difficulties faced by female entrepreneurs and emphasizes the necessity of specific laws and programs to encourage their economic contribution and empowerment. The article contributes to the body of literature by focusing on a group that is underrepresented in that area—women entrepreneurs.

However, several things are of concern in this article.

The Bodoland Territorial Region (BTR) of Assam, India, is the specific subject of the article's focus on women entrepreneurs. The findings' applicability to other contexts or regions is limited by their limited geographic scope. To give readers a more thorough grasp of the opportunities and difficulties faced by women entrepreneurs across various regions, it would be helpful to include a more comprehensive comparison with women entrepreneurship in other areas.

It is difficult to compare the findings of this article with earlier research in order to obtain a strong and thorough justification that will be helpful for practical recommendations and additional research because there are very few literature reviews and prior studies.

The methodology for gathering the data, including the sample size, sampling strategy, and response rate, is not sufficiently described in the article. Evaluating the representativeness and reliability of the survey results is challenging in the absence of this data. The study would be more credible if it were more open about its research design and methodology.

While discussing the investigation of women's entrepreneurship's effects on the socioeconomic advancement of the area, the article lacks a thorough analysis or empirical data to substantiate what it says.
