Review of: "Redesign Considerations for a Person-Centred Nursing Home System"

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The commentary "Redesign Considerations for a Person-Centred Nursing Home System" presents a strong conceptual discussion using systems and complexity science to highlight structural weaknesses in global nursing home care, and its strength lies in integrating leadership, governance, and organisational redesign principles with a holistic person-centred care perspective. However, the article has notable weaknesses, particularly its heavy reliance on theoretical frameworks and conceptual arguments without providing empirical data, comparative outcome analysis, or measurable implementation models to support the proposed redesign strategies. The discussion also lacks clear operational pathways, cost-effectiveness considerations, and evaluation metrics that policymakers or healthcare administrators could apply in real settings. Additionally, the global generalisation of nursing home challenges is not supported by cross-country comparative evidence or case-study validation. To improve the work, the authors should incorporate quantitative outcome indicators (e.g., hospitalisation rates, quality-of-life metrics, workforce retention data), include real-world case studies or pilot interventions demonstrating successful system redesign, and propose practical monitoring and governance frameworks that allow evaluation of person-centred implementation effectiveness.
