Also, it declares specifically what they want to do. The reader is aware of the paper's development, methodology, and how results would be finally presented. I recommend it for further review and a better understanding of the Nigerian political environment. However, I think the literature review (international) linking with the core of the article could be increased. This is relevant to inform academia about the links between the proposed scientific exercise and other (relevant) international experiences.
