A reviewer's comment on the manuscript entitled:

"Sustainable entrepreneurial ecosystems in developing economies: A conceptualization of complex adaptive systems approach"

### General

In general, the paper presents useful information to the body of knowledge and practice. It presents a conceptualization of sustainable entrepreneurial ecosystems (SEEs) in developing economies, using a complex adaptive systems approach. It reviews the literature on value chains, inclusive business models, and sustainable business models, and identifies the areas of convergence and divergence with SEEs. It proposes a set of propositions that link the micro, meso, and macro level processes and outcomes of SEEs, and suggests directions for future research. The paper will have a significant theoretical and practical contribution by incorporating the following comments in the relevant sections of the manuscript as indicated below.

### **Abstract**

The abstract section of this manuscript provides a clear overview of the key concepts and terms used in the paper. However, you should state the general and specific topics of your research in the first sentence, so that readers know what your paper is about right away. You should also state the central questions or statement of the problem your research addresses, and why it is important to address them. You should describe the methods you've used to conduct your research. You should state the main conclusions you've drawn from your research, and how they contribute to the existing knowledge or practice in your field. You should acknowledge the limitations of your research.

This manuscript has no keywords. Keywords are words or phrases that capture the main topics or themes of your research manuscript. However, there are some possible gaps or areas for improvement that could be addressed, such as:

- The paper relies mostly on secondary sources and literature reviews to support its arguments. It would be beneficial to include some empirical evidence or case studies from developing countries.
- The paper focuses on the specific context of sustainable entrepreneurial ecosystems in developing countries, but it
  does not compare or contrast this context with other types of entrepreneurial ecosystems or other regions. It would be
  interesting to explore how the complex adaptive systems processes differ or are similar across different settings and
  how contextual factors influence the outcomes and impacts of sustainable entrepreneurship.

## 3. Methodology

It does not discuss the potential challenges, risks, or trade-offs involved in implementing or sustaining sustainable entrepreneurial ecosystems.
