The author stated: 'The study employed a retrospective design, extracting data from newspaper reports from approximately 11,000 medical records in two Bangladeshi hospitals'. I suggest rewriting the methodology.

Results:

- 1. The author mentioned that most of the cases were from non-lethal weapons. It would be helpful for readers if the author could give examples of such weapons.
- 2. The statement '55% of these injuries affected the head, neck, or face' is confusing. The detail of how it is affected is lacking.

Discussion:

- 1. The discussion lacks focus on the results of the current study. The author spent too much time on the results of other studies instead.
- 2. The author states that the incidence of ocular trauma is on the rise in the conclusion. This is not evidenced in the current work. Therefore, this conclusion is not substantiated.
