- Meanwhile, to make the paper a little more robust and conforming, I suggest the authors address these concerns:
 - 1. Introduction: The authors may want to cite two or three references to lay a better foundation for the study.
 - 2.2. Procedures: How many participants were recruited into each of the three groups mentioned?
 - 2.3. Data Collection: What was the language of discussion? Any transcription required? Could the authors give a
 little more detail of what the focus group discussed?
 - 3.1. Theme 1: Nurses' Attitudes Toward Pain Management: The authors should avoid referring to previous studies when presenting results.
 - 3.2. Theme 2: Family Involvement in Pain Management. This is a result sub-section. Any statement of 'Discussion' should be rightly placed!
 - 3.3. Theme 3: Nurses' Knowledge: Same as 3.2
 - Lastly, I presume the authors' grouping of participants was deliberate; were there variations in findings based on such grouping?
