

Review of: "Does Anger Management Among Prisoners Work? — A Review of Recent Meta-Analyses"

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The article is centred on the relationship between anger and the possibility of prisoners incurring reoffenses. The introduction offers a solid framework, explaining anger within a carceral context; however, it does not indicate what the objectives of the article are. This lack of a specific direction leaves the article feeling somewhat incomplete, despite the relevance of the topic discussed. As the article progresses, it delves into recent meta-analysis, highlighting some positive methodological approaches by different authors and possible research gaps. The body of the work leaves the reader with the impression that the article is trying to be a comprehensive and complete contextualisation of the state of research regarding anger in the correctional system, but there needs to be a more methodical approach to judge all the cited literature, one that uses the same criteria for all and that is explained and justified by the authors in a different section in order for this apparent objective to be successful. The conclusion makes it seem like the authors have analysed the link between anger and revindicism based purely on secondary research, which isn't clear enough based on the previous sections. To summarise, the article shows extensive research on a very relevant topic but, without a clear objective, it feels a little disjointed and lacking in analysis.
