This is a great topic and an interesting study.

Title: The title would benefit from an indication of the type of research, e.g., literature review

Background: What is the aim of the study?

Method:

<u>Topics or categories</u>: The information was grouped according to topics. Were these topics decided on beforehand/a priori? Was it deductive analysis? How were the themes constructed?

<u>Literature search</u>: "By searching all possible extensive reports of people with recurrent or multiple OBEs from 2000 to 2021, we retrieved 13 such reports". How was the literature searched? In databases? Other? How many eligible reports were found? What were the criteria? How were the 13 selected?

<u>First-person versus second-person account</u>: It is stated that data consists of 13 first-person accounts. If the accounts have been published, they were either written by the persons experiencing the phenomenon (first-person) or by a researcher that conducted the interviews (second person). How were the accounts published?

<u>Source</u>: The sources are missing in the References. It is not possible for the reader to locate the following sources of data: Tressoldi et al. 2014, Patelli 1984, Nicholls et al. 2019, Melendez 2016, Seller 2016, 2017, DeGracia 2006, Johnson 2016, Kellogg 2016.

<u>Analysis</u>: It is stated that classical qualitative Content Analysis approach (Selvi, 2019) was used avoiding any interpretative approach. In a qualitative content analysis, it is usually stated whether the analysis is deductive or inductive. How did you decide on the categories?

Discussion:

It appears that the discussion is not really a discussion between your findings and the existing literature. It is just a summary of the results.



Conclusions:

The conclusions are more like a discussion. The conclusion should be the final analysis of the study and show what we have learned and what we should do now.
