- Political commitment is an indispensable component of any public health activity. In this context, we need to empower
  public health specialists who have sound scientific knowledge and administrative capability to make appropriate
  decisions and implement them at the district/city level. On the other hand, they need to be capable of advocating to
  politicians and people's representatives what should be done in each stage. Advocacy and communication by public
  health experts were largely lacking during Covid-19.
- Business industries have made important contributions to the development of different diagnostic, therapeutic, and
  protective equipment throughout the pandemic. Governments should have taken stringent control over business
  agencies regarding their production and use, but this was not the reality. This is another area where the governments
  of low- and middle-income countries should develop a policy decision.
- I absolutely agree that isolation and quarantine guidelines had to be developed considering the local context and maintaining due respect for local habits and traditions.

In conclusion, this article provided us with very useful messages that should govern us as we shape an appropriate strategy for our fight against anticipated future pandemics.
