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The title of this paper is too simple and does not specifically reflect the contents of the paper, while the contents of the paper discuss clusters from an epidemiological perspective. All references used are relevant and very supportive. However, the discussion of each case is less concrete, especially from a statistical perspective. In my opinion, the quality of this paper can be further improved by providing graphic illustrations for clustering, which is very relevant in cluster analysis, and also by providing a more detailed explanation of the advantages and disadvantages of each approach presented in relation to epidemiological clustering.
