Additionally, restructuring the headings, including the use of subheadings, would enhance the organization of the paper. Furthermore, a concluding section should be included to distinctly summarize the author's thoughts, distinguishing them from the authors and references discussed throughout the text. The reprinted version of the article is definitely clearer and better explained. The topic is indeed relevant, and the discourse holds significant value in the current global landscape.

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
