Review of: "Sociodemographic, Clinical, and Psychological Barriers to Medication Compliance: The Case of Patients with Musculoskeletal Disorders in Greece"

This paper makes a significant contribution to the field of health psychology and healthcare management by investigating the critical issue of medication adherence among patients with musculoskeletal disorders. The authors have adopted a multifaceted approach, addressing sociodemographic, clinical, and psychological factors, which significantly enriches our understanding of this complex topic. The methodology is sound, and the results are reliable. In particular, the demographic variables used by the authors (gender, education, marital status, unpaid/paid helper, economic status, place of residence, insurance, employment status, type of work), as well as the clinical (musculoskeletal disorder status, comorbidity) and psychological (physical and mental fatigue) factors, apply to the vast majority of patients. The manuscript is very well structured, including all the parts that a scientific paper must have.
