

Review of: "Methotrexate Induced Lymphadenitis: A Case Report"

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The article describes a case of the development of an extremely rare complication of methotrexate therapy. The development of lymphoproliferative conditions during methotrexate therapy is well known. But more often, these are malignant lymphomas. If I had encountered something similar in my practice, I would have thought about the correctness of the diagnosis of RA. It seems to me most likely that in most of these cases, there is a combination of RA and SjS. The article is quite small in volume, and I propose to discuss in more detail the various causes of lymphadenitis in the presented patient. Since the only evidence of a connection between lymphadenitis and methotrexate was the relief of lymphadenitis when methotrexate was discontinued, which is certainly not insignificant, but not entirely convincing. It is unclear from the case description whether the patient received methotrexate for all 7 years after diagnosis and well tolerated it.
