The authors have presented an intriguing case study examining the public's perception of the COVID-19 pandemic from a discursive perspective, thereby contributing to an enhanced comprehension of cognitive behaviors during the pandemic in underdeveloped countries. This, in turn, may help inform public health education and communication initiatives. The article is organized coherently and the conceptual framework appears to be skillfully crafted.

However, I am curious to learn how the authors have codified their interview data, and what specific criteria they used to classify the four groups of examples they presented in the manuscript. Moreover, the authors might more effectively engage with existing studies in the section "Contextualizing the study" by incorporating more literature dialogue.

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
