### Refining ESP Learning and Increasing Motivation through the Incorporation of Technology into TBLT

This article offers an interesting topic by discussing how ESP learning can increase motivation by incorporating technology into Task-Based Language teaching (TBLT). However, the following are some things to re-consider regarding the content of the article.

1. The author needs to reorganize his paragraphs. A paragraph cannot consist of only one sentence; at least it has to have the thesis statement, the supporting sentences, and the concluding sentence.
2. Also, the author should not begin a paragraph with quotations. You should provide your own arguments/explanation first. After that, you can support your arguments with quotations.
3. In addition, some paragraphs do not provide quotations/references. Every paragraph must contain references to support your arguments/opinion and to avoid plagiarism.
4. The author needs to reconsider the abstract. Important points that should be in the abstract include your purpose of bringing the topic, the subject matters, how you conducted the study, the research design, the instruments, how you collected and analyzed the data, the results and conclusions, and the implication of the study.
5. Many references that the author cited are outdated. The author needs to Find newer sources that are published a maximum of 10 years backward. If this reference is a grand theory, try to support this theory with articles on relevant topics published more recently.
6. The author is suggested to organize the Findings and Discussion separately.
7. In this section (discussion), you need to compare your results or findings with findings in previous research. Is there any difference? Are there any new insights? Is there any consistency, and so on?
8. The discussion of the study should contain these aspects:
  1. Your arguments/opinions about the results or the findings of the study.
  2. Supporting opinion/view from other researchers/ from other articles that can strengthen your arguments
9. The Conclusion must answer the problem statement of the study (written before the METHODS section). A conclusion

is a relationship of variables that are stated in the problem statement and proven with the Results of the study and elaborated in the Discussion Section.
