

Review of: "Are Academic Libraries Doing Enough to Support the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)? A State-of-the-Art Review"

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The author applied sophisticated research methods and techniques and did a great job of answering the question: "How do academic libraries contribute to achieving the SDGs?" More specifically, several research questions were addressed, namely: How do library activities (collection development, programming, and outreach) contribute to achieving the SDGs? How do the actions of individual librarians and library staff contribute to achieving the SDGs? How does library organizational culture support or hinder the achievement of the SDGs? What role does library management play in achieving the SDGs? How can libraries collaborate with other organizations to achieve the SDGs? How can libraries use KPIs to improve their efforts to achieve the SDGs?

The work is undoubtedly interesting, and the researcher obtained a number of useful and valuable results, but, unfortunately, there is no unambiguous integral indicator. Can we firmly state that academic libraries are doing enough to support the Sustainable Development Goals, not only in developing countries, but in the world in general? Which are we closer to in terms of sustainability: "Neverland or Tomorrowland?" This is a question, according to Portuguese scientists, of the first order (Costa, J., Cancela, D., Reis, J.
