

Review of: "[Case Report] Prednisolone Induced Gingival Enlargement: A Rare Case Report"

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The present case report illustrates a rare case of prednisolone-induced gingival overgrowth in reactive arthritis patients. It is an interesting story because it is a medicine that is so widely consumed by the general population around the world. The case report describes a male patient with reactive arthritis who had been treated with prednisolone for 1 year. The clinical and histopathological results are in agreement with growth due to gingival hypertrophy. However, the patient reported gingival growth 6 years ago. What causes 1-year use of prednisolone to be associated with anterior gingival growth? Has this patient not taken any other medication in previous years? It is necessary to check the medical history.
