Instead of presenting a broad overview, the author should delve into the details of each key focus area, providing a nuanced understanding of the strategies proposed. Consider incorporating case studies or successful interventions in each focus area to illustrate practical applications.

Empirical Evidence: To enhance the manuscript's overall impact, the author should consider incorporating more empirical evidence to support their arguments. This could involve including data, case studies, or examples that highlight the effectiveness of the One Health approach in similar contexts.

Policy Recommendations: A more explicit exploration of policy implications stemming from the proposed key focus areas would strengthen the manuscript. Discussing how the suggested strategies align with existing public health policies in Indonesia and proposing recommendations for policy adjustments would add depth to the discussion.

In conclusion, while the manuscript presents an interesting and pertinent perspective on the One Health approach for

mosquito-borne disease control in Indonesia, the suggested improvements in the sections on cross-sector collaboration and key focus areas would significantly enhance its depth and impact.
