Thank you for allowing me to review this manuscript. This work aimed to offer an overview of the neuropsychiatric and social consequences of ADHD in females. Overall, I found that the manuscript approaches an extremely interesting, relevant, and current topic, and I congratulate the authors for their work. I enlist, below, a few thoughts and minor suggestions:

- The authors begin by stating that ADHD in females is under-recognized and under-diagnosed. I completely agree! I believe it would be interesting to include a small paragraph aiming at helping clinicians better identify ADHD in females as, often, the primary diagnosis is that of anxiety, depression, or even borderline personality disorder. What should we be looking at that might help us make a differential diagnosis?
- As we all know, it is crucial to diagnose ADHD early, so that intervention practices might help mitigate the possible
 nefarious consequences of the disorder that you so well describe. It would also be interesting to talk about ADHD in
 school-aged girls. How can girls and boys be differentiated? What should we be paying attention to? As you speak of
 puberty and early adulthood, a small paragraph before these would provide an essential introduction to better reflect
 the developmental pathway of the disorder.
- I would recommend a thorough review of the text as I found a few oversights (e.g., ". **AHDH** in females is presently a subject of increasing interest." Or "Further research is needed to understand the factors [that] increase the risk of poor...").

Lastly, I commend the authors for mentioning the seldom-remembered positive traits of ADHD!

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
