- Absence of Global Perspective: While primarily focusing on discussing Britain's role within Africa, incorporating global
 context into this discourse could enrich it further. Drawing comparisons with other former colonial powers or highlighting
 collaborations with non-colonial nations will contribute towards achieving a comprehensive understanding.
