

# Review of: "International Clinicians and Academics Supporting the Refugee Journey- A Personal Experience and Perspective"

The article is based on the author's own experience, which implies total originality. The study presents the experiences of some of the refugees with whom the author has had the opportunity to work. It is an unpublished work.

The nature of the article could be related to the results of a field diary. Very interesting and useful results from an ethnographic perspective. As a social scientist, I believe that ethnographic studies are scientifically rich and should be published. However, as constructive criticism it requires more citation, use of bibliography and application of methodology in line with a case study.

In other words, social science and qualitative methodology also require a minimum level of quality. This aspect is sometimes blinded by the large output of quantitative studies and their position in science. It is very important to keep in mind that, just as the development of skills is required for quantitative research, skills are also required for qualitative studies.

That said, I believe that author Clive Kelly's study is rich in many respects. Starting with the very fact of the fieldwork that underlies this article. Interdisciplinary (doctors, nurses, social workers, educators, etc.) and cooperative work is necessary in the social phenomenon of refugees. National and international social action is essential. That is why I believe that a lot of work has been done and that it is necessary to pass on experiences and information. As well as the initiatives created in the different countries where some of the actions described in the article have been carried out. Always as a way of making the situation in refugee camps and shelters more visible, in addition to individual actions.

Ultimately, the article could be published for its descriptive and memorialistic character. It is not a typical academic article. It should be publishable, as many of these experiences are left in a drawer when the research is finished. Which I consider a waste as a social scientist.

That said, with some improvement it could be treated as a fully acceptable academic article.
