This article represents intensive work on the correctly defined object of study as prefigurative policies. However, it presents a serious "ethnocentrism" issue by relying on a literature review of Western indexations. I believe that a proper study cannot exclude the following data sources:

- 1. SciELO (Scientific Electronic Library Online): It is an electronic library that encompasses a wide collection of scientific journals from Latin America, the Caribbean, Spain, and Portugal. SciELO is an excellent source for finding research journals in South America.
- 2. African Journals Online (AJOL): This platform offers access to a large number of academic journals from Africa in various fields, including social sciences, natural sciences, and humanities.
- 3. Asian Journals Online (AsiaJOL): Similar to AJOL, AsiaJOL provides access to a wide range of academic journals from Asia in areas such as science, technology, medicine, humanities, and social sciences.
- 4. DOAJ (Directory of Open Access Journals): Although not exclusively focused on journals from Asia, Africa, or South America, DOAJ is a global database that indexes open-access scientific journals from around the world, including many journals from these regions.
- 5. ERIC (Education Resources Information Center): Although better known for its focus on education, ERIC indexes research journals from various regions, including Asia, Africa, and South America, especially those focusing on education.

Therefore, it would be entirely correct to broaden the databases with material from the origin of the studied problem, even if they are not in the sources of more prestigious Western academia.
