This is an interesting short paper which covers important aspects of contemporary world. The intention of author is to show that historically and culturally narrow conceptualizations need to be extended for a useful explanations and feasible solutions. The discrepancies in the present multi polar world on various laws including the "Law of the Seas" have been highlighted.

The author considers the contemporary world in a highly complex and dynamics structure. He referred that most of the studies to explain the global political changes are constructed on specific cultural, historical and geographical experiences based on the "Westphalian Peace Model". According to him, the disturbances in today's world include a myriad of cultures, regions, and historical experiences.

Despite its usefulness and merits, the study has some limitations. The author has followed a deductive approach with qualitative methodology. It is nice in arguments and logical reasoning.
